From the Desk of the Head, Yoon Soo Park, PhD

Welcome to the summer edition of the DME newsletter.

This year, we celebrate the 65th anniversary of DME. Founded in 1959 by George E. Miller, MD, ours is the oldest continuously operating department of its kind in the world. The scientific research of DME continues to shape how physicians and health professionals are trained and enter the healthcare workforce. Our international graduates, from the health professions education (HPE) and patient safety leadership (PSL) programs, are making important leadership initiatives across our field, ensuring better training, quality and safety, and healthcare for patients and global public health. We are also entering an exciting and dynamic era of medical education research and practice—seeing the promise of data science, outcomes research, and health humanities all



being integrated into healthcare training.

We are deeply grateful to **Morton E. Harris**, **PhD**, for establishing the Ilene B. Harris Endowed Professorship, to follow the legacy of his late wife, **Ilene B. Harris**, **PhD**, in leading our department and the field toward academic excellence. It is a tremendous honor for me to hold the inaugural professorship. The investiture ceremony in May was a wonderful celebration, bringing together our school and our medical education community. The gift from Morton Harris also established the Ilene B. Harris Legacy Research Fund, now entering its 4th cycle of funding educational research—a gift that is already having significant impact, including the recently published **JAMA Surgery** (2024;159[5]:546-52) article by our Harris grant recipient **Brigitte K. Smith, MD, MHPE** ('20), demonstrating the link between training and healthcare outcomes.

Please join us on **Thu, Aug 1,** for the **24th Annual HPE Summer Conference**. The theme of this year's conference, chaired by **Maura Polansky, PA-C, MHPE, PhD**, is "The Emerging Role of Artificial Intelligence in HPE." We have internationally distinguished invited speakers and a panel of guests who will discuss cutting-edge trends in AI and their application in education.

This fall, we will launch our new PhD program in HPE led by Laura Hirshfield, PhD, with new doctoral students joining our department. We will also launch the new Certificate in Health Professions Education (CHPE) program, led by Maura Polansky, PA-C, MHPE, PhD. In addition, we are starting a new scholarly concentration program for medical students, Education in Medicine (EdMED), led by Alan Schwartz, PhD, JD. These new HPE programs, adding to our renowned Master of Health Professions Education (MHPE), will provide excellent training for future HPE scholars and leaders. We warmly welcome our new cohorts of trainees to our programs!

Our colleague, **Rachel Yudkowsky**, **MD**, **MHPE**, has been appointed Professor Emerita of Medical Education following her extraordinary, 25-year career at the University of Illinois College of Medicine. Dr. Yudkowsky has been a distinguished scholar, master teacher, and leader for our school and field.

We are excited to welcome **Lauren A. Maggio, PhD**, to our department as new faculty. Dr. Maggio will also serve as Director of Research for DME. Dr. Maggio comes to us from the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences (Bethesda, MD) where she was full professor. Since 2019, Dr. Maggio has served as Deputy Editor-in-Chief of **Perspectives on Medical Education**.

Introduction of Yoon Soo Park, PhD Ilene B. Harris Professor of Medical Education

Investiture Ceremony: Thu, May 30University Club of Chicago

Sixty-five years ago, in 1959, **Dr. George E.**Miller came to the UIC College of Medicine to establish an office of research in medical education, today's Department of Medical Education—for which he had high aspirations as a place to study medical education and prepare better teachers. The department continues to be a gold standard worldwide in medical and health professions education. Dr. Miller's legacy is well embodied in DME's vision and mission statements, namely, "to

Yoon Soo's remarkable productivity and commitment to excellence in assessment are driving forces in transforming health professions education and have earned him the respect and collaboration of his fellow researchers, students, and alumni, both at UIC as well as at other institutions nationally and internationally. No wonder he has held leadership positions in national organizations, such as: chairmanship of the Research in Medical Education Committee for the

better healthcare through effective and innovative health professions education leaders and scholars [who can] advance the field locally, regionally, and internationally."

We are greatly indebted and grateful to **Dr**. Morty Harris (see right) for perpetuating and enriching Dr. Miller's pioneering vision by creating an endowed professorship in honor of Dr. Ilene Harris, his late, beloved wife and former professor and head of DME. Ilene was a passionate promotor of excellence in scholarship and leadership and a very generous person—generous of her time and wisdom that gave tremendous drive to the mission and goals of the department through her own scholarship in qualitative research and through her leadership, resulting in the creation of a certificate program in patient safety and a doctoral program in curriculum studies in collaboration with UIC's College of Education. This new professorship strengthens DME's enduring commitment to the highest quality research and educational best practices and emblazons its reputation as a world leader in medical and health professions education.

Professor Yoon Soo Park came to the Department of Medical Education 12 years ago as a psychometrician to conduct research and development projects and teach and advise our graduate students. Well, we struck gold. There are four emblematic standards that have come to characterize DME, namely, leadership, scholarship, high standards, and a spirit of innovation that, taken together, help move the field of medical and health professions education forward. Yoon Soo fully embodies these four standards and is a role model to us all.

Dr. Park's scholarship, firmly grounded in state-of-the-art psychometric principles, is extraordinary, both in breadth and in depth. Yoon Soo is committed to further our understanding of the conceptual, methodological, and human aspects of assessment and psychometrics. He is the recipient of scores of grants and contracts from leading funding agencies and has made meaningful contributions to the field—with scientific papers in medical education and in measurement journals, as well as countless scientific presentations and educational workshops. Yoon Soo is at the forefront of innovation in the field as exemplified in his use of Al-based adaptive analytics and machine learning to bridge assessment across undergraduate and graduate medical education, and for patient care, in order to optimize learner feedback and program development in an age of outcome-based education and inquiry.

Association of American Medical Colleges, vice-presidency for the American Educational Research Association's Division-I (a continuation of a position that Dr. Miller helped create in the 1960s), and lead psychometrician and data scientist for the American College of Emergency Physicians and the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education, as well as associate editor for leading journals in health professions education—and, more recently, in spearheading and housing at UIC a multi-institutional repository for assessment data from different national licensing and accrediting agencies.

Yoon Soo is a delight and an inspiration to work with, as I've had the pleasure to witness firsthand while working with him on a national formative-assessment project at the American College of Surgeons. He is a tireless worker, with very high standards, and is masterful in getting colleagues from different institutions and disciplines to understand psychometrics. to collaborate—and most of all to excel, as shown in the high honors he received from prestigious institutions like the National Council on Measurement in Education and most recently as a research fellow at the Karolinska Institute in Sweden. His spirit of excellence and empowerment is contagious, setting the tone and direction for others to follow.

You make us very proud as the recipient of the Ilene B. Harris Professor of Medical Education, knowing that you will continue to bring institutional prestige to DME and UIC. Echoing Ilene's spirit and memory, you are, Yoon Soo, truly a gentleman and a scholar.

DME's new "Education in Medicine" (EdMED) scholarly concentration program has accepted its first cohort of incoming medical students, including five from the Peoria campus, and three each from the Rockford and Chicago campuses. This project is designed to give rising third-year students the opportunity to practice presenting patient notes in front of an attending before they jump into their brand-new clerkships.

SAIL participated in a Trauma-Informed Care presentation for second-year students. This plenary session may be developed into an SP encounter for the next academic year.

Other projects this spring included: graduate medical education (GME) Pediatrics Rehearsal for Authenticity case, Cardiology SP Encounter, Occupational Therapy SP encounter, M4 Medical Spanish Elective, AAP Mental Health Course Scenario, GME OBGYN Rehearsal for Authenticity case, M1 Abdominal Workshop.

TECHNOLOGY-BASED SIMULATION (TBS)

Back in January, we wrapped up the new hire instructor training and trained a handful of SPs to help us with upcoming projects.

In February, we hosted the M4 Transition to Residency Sim Code program, marking our heartfelt farewell to the graduating **Class of 2024**. They were an exceptional class and we wish them well in all their future endeavors.

By April, we concluded the M2 Synthesis program, hosted yet another triumphant Emergency Medicine (EM) Regional

and the post-encounter debrief went so well, faculty is eager to turn this case into a full-fledged SP encounter later this year.

It's evident that SAIL's dedication to excellent simulation-based education has led to remarkable successes and strong partnerships. Long-standing clients, like GME EM and Pediatrics, have continued to book simulation projects with SAIL. EM holds Conference at SAIL almost every Thursday morning and monthly ultrasound training. GME Pediatrics has scheduled additional training sessions for their residents. Outside client, Almost Home Kids, has also added quarterly training for their staff. In addition, our collaboration with Innovation Medicine **Program** faculty and students has wrapped up its second year, with final projects presented in April. Other recurring projects include: M3 Pediatric and Surgery Clerkships, M4 Anesthesiology and EM Clerkships, UIC Global Health, and GME IM Procedural Skills Training.

Finally, TBS is gearing up for the M3 Transition to Clerkship (TTC) series: First Death, PPE, and Procedural Skills. This year, the HBS team is joining the fun by running the Mock Rounds during TTC.

For the second year, SAIL is proud to share that we've partnered with <u>Pet Partners</u> (see below) for the First Death project. This is by far the best partnership SAIL has ever had!

Other spring and summer projects include: M1 Synthesis, M3 Intersections, Resident Skills Assessments, and other resident onboarding and training.

TBS appreciates the long hours and hard work the simulation technicians, skills instructors, and SPs put in. We've said it before and will say it again: SAIL would not be the successful enterprise it is without each and every one of you all. Thank you!



Annual Joseph S. Begando Keynote Lecture Tue, Mar 12 - Moss Auditorium

In collaboration with the Institute for Research on Race and Public Policy at the College of Urban Planning and Public Affairs and on behalf of the College of Medicine, DME was pleased to welcome David H. Chae, ScD, MA (shown below), in March to give the 2024 Joseph S. Begando keynote lecture, "Causes of Death: Macro-Social Determinants of Health, the Biological Embedding of Racism, & Next Steps in Anti-Racism Research."



Dr. Chae's engaging lecture examined social, ecological, psychobiological, and developmental approaches to studying racism and developing antiracist interventions. Dr. Chae is Director of the Society, Health, and Racial Equity Lab as well as Associate Dean for Research at the Tulane University School of Public Health and Tropical Medicine.

The Annual Joseph S. Begando Keynote Lecture is sponsored by DME and brings distinguished scholars in the health humanities to the UIC community to explore pressing social issues relating to health, medicine, disability, and illness. This lecture series was established in the 1990s in honor of Dr. Begando who, over 40 years, taught and served variously within the university system—sequentially holding the roles of assistant dean, assistant to the president, acting vice president, vice president and chief executive officer, chancellor, chancellor emeritus, and, finally, professor emeritus.

Prior to the talk, we welcomed Dr. Chae to DME for lunch with students from the College of Medicine and the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. We were honored to be joined also by Dean **Wayne H. Giles, MD, MS**, from the School of Public Health.

Assessment FOR Learning, A Renewed Plea

While most of our attention in education is on assessment OF learning (i.e., summative assessment), the flipside, assessment FOR learning (i.e., formative assessment), is an integral part of the teaching-learning process... "to better identify learning needs and problems" on the one hand and "to develop a stronger understanding of [one's] own



academic strengths and weaknesses" on the other hand.1

Research has shown that "a combination of study and tests is more effective than spending the same amount of time reviewing the material some other way, such as rereading it. [Moreover, tests that require] explicit retrieval, as required by a recall task [e.g., write-in responses] rather than a recognition task, strengthened knowledge better than a multiple-choice test even when the final test itself involves multiple choice [suggesting that] instructional practices would

be more effective if the proportion of learning time that learners spend retrieving information were dramatically increased." Research and development initiatives in DME over the years provide some guidance to enhance assessment for learning.

The American College of Surgeons developed a formative assessment tool for beginning surgery residents, the Entering Residents Readiness Assessment (ACS-ERRA), which contains 40 short cases testing 140 challenging clinical decisions ("key features") for entering residents, using short menus and write-in response formats, of which a quarter of the decisions address potentially harmful actions.³ After completing an ACS-ERRA, each resident receives an individualized report on their performance, highlighting strengths and weaknesses, with a copy to their program director, along with a learning contract to set goals, action plans, and deadlines. There is room for improvement for all, from residents with the highest scores to the weakest ones, especially regarding clinical decisions that could lead to potentially harmful consequences to patients. Following guidelines from Boscardin et al⁴ on implementing assessment for learning as a teacher-learner partnership, the ACS-ERRA reports and learning contracts provide opportunities to "identify what the learner needs to learn (planning), review where the learner is in their learning (observing), and strategize how to maximize learning (supporting)."

Script concordance tests (SCTs) were shown to contain severe validity threats, such as logical inconsistencies in the scoring keys, a response scale that overly rewards the selection of answers near or at the midpoint of the scale, and ignoring interpanel and panelists, and test-retest measurement error in calculating SCT score reliability.⁵ However, expert panelists' limited consistency with prior responses led to suggesting an alternative use of SCTs, namely that rather than telling "examinees whether their answers are correct or incorrect based on how many experts agreed with them, they might be asked to view the diverse expert responses [and those of their peers] and available clinical evidence, to engage in debate. [Thus], the learning objectives might refer, not to knowing the 'correct' answer, but to gaining better understanding of all sides of an underlying controversy."⁶

While formative assessment is designed specifically to provide feedback to learners, ⁷ all assessment, formative and summative, affects learning.⁸ So much so that van der Vleuten⁹ included the educational impact of assessment as a key component of his utility model of any assessment method, along with validity, reliability, acceptability, and cost—noting that, "despite the wide recognition of its importance, the empirical work reported is scarce."

DME faculty and alumni are engaged in several research and development projects focused on struggling medical students and residents based on rotation evaluations and Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education Milestone ratings. For example, "when sufficient numbers of evaluations are used [and minimizing delays in logging ratings], end-of-rotation evaluations provide preliminary evidence with which to detect and predict [struggling] residents in subsequent postgraduate training years." The Milestone studies, 12-15 alternatively, focus on clarifying various sources of variance in scores, such as the contribution of learner variations, graduating medical school, and residency program, and on estimating the predictive power of the ratings, from undergraduate medical education to residency, board certification, and patient outcomes. These studies have prompted interinstitutional collaborations, such as the Pediatrics Milestones Assessment Collaborative and, more recently, the Medical School Outcomes Milestones Study Group Theorem 2012.

In conclusion, here's a plea for assessment FOR learning, voiced some six decades ago by DME's founder, <u>George E. Miller, MD</u>¹⁸: "...my new look is really a plea for another look at evaluation [assessment] as a tool for education, not merely an administrative device for the separation of those who falter from those who succeed [and to] transform what is too often a distasteful chore for faculty and students alike into a gratifying part of the stirring experience which teaching and learning should
